

# Minutes

The [January] meeting was convened at 2:30 p.m. by Superintendent DeVault. He expressed his thanks to the Ohio Valley Lines for hosting Division 2 for another year. President Dick Jackson of the OVL welcomed the Division once again.

There were no new members or guests.

There were no minutes for November due to an error on the part of the Chief Clerk.

#### **Committee Reports**

Keystone Flyer – The Editor was not present, so there was no report, other than the Keystone Flyer is no longer published on paper. This will create a substantial cost savings for the Division. A color edition of the newsletter is available on the Division website.

Treasurer – The Treasurer reported that he renewed our CD for \$10,000 and the interest we received was transferred to the savings account. The balance of the checking account is a moving target since bills are paid and funds transferred from the savings account as necessary.

Programs – Asst. Superintendent Frank Benders listed the location of upcoming meetings: February – Marshall Twp. Municipal Building hosted by Hobby Express; March – Scenic Express in Murrysville. There will be no program to allow members more time to purchase essential scenic supplies; April – 2018 Jamboree at Robert Morris University at what used to be the Holiday Inn on University Blvd.; May – There is nothing firm yet as there are many conflicts with Mother's Day, Regional Conventions and more; July – As usual, there will be no meeting in July; August – the Annual Division 2 Picnic at Henley Park in Leetsdale. The September, October and November meetings will be held in the Steubenville area, North Huntingdon and New Eagle, as in past years

Company Store – Susan Werner noted that members can still order Morning Sun books for a 20% discount.

Membership – Tom Gaus reported that we now stand at 226 members. Our number seems to fluctuate due to differences between what we and the National consider a member.

Website – The website is up to date. Items are being added for the Jamboree.

Free-Mo - There was no report.

Bring 'N Brag – There were eight entries. Please vote. Next month's category will be a train station.

Video Library - No Bud, no report.

Achievement Program – There was no activity over the holidays.

#### Old Business

The World's Greatest Hobby Show went quite well as far as the Division is concerned. A lot of people expressed interest in the hobby.

### New Business

The Superintendent asked for volunteers to serve on the Nominating Committee for the upcoming elections. Joel Everly, and Arley Mitchell volunteered. We need one more individual.

Grier Kuehn reported on progress for the upcoming Jamboree. It will still be held at Robert Morris University, but in a different building. It is located across from Primanti's Restaurant on University Boulevard. There will be a map on our web site. There will be 12 clinics. If the faces are the same, the subject will be different. Tony Cook, who has written for several hobby magazines, will give a clinic and speak after dinner. There will be contests. People were encouraged to enter as sometimes the competition can be weak. There will also be the usual white elephant sale and raffle.

A lengthy discussion ensued about how much and why the Division pays to local organizations to host our meetings. It seems that one of our previous hosts feels that what we've paid in the past is inadequate. A motion was made and seconded to keep the "honorarium" at \$100. The motion passed by unanimous voice vote. Unless circumstances change, as determined by the executive board, the amount will remain at \$100.

The annual RPM meet will be held in Malvern, Pa 23 - 25 March. There will be lots of venders and lots of clinics. Next year's meet will be held in Greensburg, as usual.

# Bring'n'Brag

A new year and we started with our friends at Ohio Valley Lines in the Old Economy Village Visitors Center. As with each January, the first Bring'n'Brag is "Anything Goes," and this year we had eight entries. In first place was Neal Schorr, with his Corner Pharmacy. This model began as a stock MTH corner Pharmacy (design Pirated from DPM). In order to make it look realistic the building was disassembled and the clunky base discarded. The sandstone window sills and lintels were all painted a realistic color, as was the brick before applying mortar, then the structure was weathered with India ink diluted in rubbing alcohol. A granular roof was applied using textured spray paint, and roof details were added. Given the large windows and prominent position this structure will occupy on a layout a simple interior was needed. Of note are the simulated bottles of prescription medicines and the cash register, both scatchbuilt.

Second place was a tie between Dennis Vaccaro's HOn3 Push Snow Plow and Jim Braum's Wheeling & Lake Erie Ballast cars 901 and 910. Dennis' snow plow, was hand molded with a new type of molding material poured into hand-worked molds. Jim built the ballast cars from covered hopper kits, with the roofs removed minus the pieces covering the ends of the cars. He also modified the weight location.

Third place was a three-way tie: John Gallagher's Union Railroad coal hoppers converted to coke service, kitbashed from Bowser H-21 Hoppers; Jim Braum's Wheeling & Lake Erie GP35 High Hood 2662 (also kitbashed), and George Pandelios's Bridge Piers & Shoes, representations of those that support the ex-PRR bridge over the Ohio River at Steubenville (Panhandle MP 42.11). The Bridge was immortalized in Grif Teller's 1953 Pennsylvania Railroad calendar painting "Crossroads of Commerce." The prototypes are poured concrete rising 65' above water level. George's models are proportionate but selectively compressed. They support a similarly proportioned model bridge for an O scale layout.

Others who entered where Mike Hohn, with his Caw. So. Box Car, and Jim Whipple, with his switch towers before and after. Thank all of you who brought Bring'n'Brag items, and as always a Big THANK YOU to each of the members that voted for your favorite entry.

George Pendelios' bridge piers. The description reads, "This sampling of bridge piers (mid-stream, "pocket", and "shorty") are representations of those that support the ex-PRR bridge over the Ohio River at Steubenville (Panhandle MP 42.11). The bridge was immortalized in Grif Teller's 1953 Pennsylvania Railroad calendar painting "Crossroads of Commerce". The prototypes are poured concrete (in 3' tall rings) rising 65' above water level. The [model] piers are proportionate but selectively compressed. They support a similarly proportioned model bridge for my O scale layout. I researched, designed, painted, and wired (for lights) 5 piers. Two of these piers are works in progress. I designed the bridge shoes (they are an 11-piece kit), assembled, and painted them."






