
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Editor's Model of the Month

What the NMRA is wishing is that those working with "People at Risk" (i.e. "Boy Scouts") for their merit badge please become very familiar with the NMRA Youth policy regarding working with under aged and handicapped children. The policy can be found on the Keystone Division website. I'm sorry I misunderstood the directive. Our Region President just wanted to make sure everyone who works with "At Risk People" becomes familiar with the new NMRA Policy.

I would like to thank those who participated in our virtual Bring & Brag over these past few months in this testing time of the Covid 19 pandemic. Arley was a bit dismayed at the July and August participation. Four entries for July's "convention kits" B&B with only 5 or 7 members voting. 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THE RAILROADING NEWS

September 2, 1957

In Part 3, I.C. Dimmley presents developments on this regional coal and merchandise road through the late 1930s.

Chapter Three: Technology Saves the Day

The year 1919 was a tough one for the railroad; the Baron and his brother-in-law, Henry Clay Frick, both passed away.

Their funerals were attended by many people, including Nikola Tesla. Tesla and the Baron had become good friends and business partners over the years. They met at one of Frick's social events, were about the same age, were immigrants from Europe, and their last names ended with the letter "a." Nevertheless, the railroad continued to flourish under the able leadership of the Baron's eldest son, Edward.

Improvements in communications became his highest priority. The Huntingdon Northern pioneered the use of telephones instead of telegraphs and installed train-order signals at six stations on their system. Management bemoaned the fact

writing so employees could write and read train orders! Edward lamented often, that ... "education creeps slowly through the Alleghenies..."

ed them trackage rights that took advantage of the HN's route over the mountains. In return, the HN received lucrative shipping contracts and access to their rails.

With these accomplishments, Edward decided to retire to his mansion and spend his twilight years building his "Lionel Empire." Edward then turned the railroad over to his eldest son, James, in 1937.

Like his father, James took advantage of the cheap labor in the dismal economy during the Depression to establish interchanges at Huntingdon, Chestnut Ridge, and at Spruce Creek. With these interchanges and overhead traffic from the N&W and PRR, the Huntingdon Northern paid handsome dividends to its shareholders when other railroads were failing during the Great Depression.

August 16, 2020 Business Meeting

The special virtual executive meeting was gaveled open by Superintendent Frank Benders at 2:31 PM. He thanked Dennis Vaccaro for hosting the meeting via GoToMeeting.

Present: Frank Benders, Andy Blenko, Jimmy Braum, Keith DeVault, Tom Gaus, Mike Hohn, Grier Kuehn, Arley Mitchell, George Pandelios, Neal Schorr, Dennis Vaccaro, and Susan Werner.

The minutes of the June meeting were accepted as published in Keystone Flyer online by acclamation.

Prior to the committee reports, Frank Benders reported that Division member Don Tomajko had passed away as a result of a heart attack.

Committee Reports:

Jamboree: Grier Kuehn reported that Robert Morris University (RMU) has outsourced the handling of all outside events to the Parkhurst Company, which previously only did the catering. The Division has had successful dealings with them and our contact person remains unchanged. RMU is holding oncampus classes and outside events are welcome. In fact, RMU has changed its policy from one of giving preference to internal events to a first come, first served priority scheme. However, the COVID-19 policy mandated by the CDC and the Commonwealth of PA and now in place at RMU would significantly impact the Jamboree if it were held today. Under current conditions, the Sewall Center would restrict clinic rooms from 54 occupants to 10. The large banquet room would have a capacity of 70 vs. the 140 that are planned for. In addition, a larger deposit of either the entire catering budget (~\$1,300) or the facility rental fee (\$4,000) would be required. The cancellation policy has also changed; should cancellation become necessary due to COVID-19 related government directives, a refund would not be forthcoming. Instead, RMU would hold the monies until the event could be rescheduled.

Grier also expressed concern about attendance even if a vaccine becomes available. The Jamboree breaks even only because of the raffle. Our typical attendance is around 125, and we plan for 140. With only 70 attendees, the Jamboree is not financially viable. The Jamboree also faces possible competition in the form of a Narrow gauge show and the RPM meet (every other year, i.e. 2021). He also expressed concern as to the number of layout tours that could be held. It was the consensus of all that the virus isn't going to come to a swift or abrupt end; it is likely to be with us for a while. Neal Schorr reported that his medical news sources believe it will continue through the end of 2021. Grier indicated that writing a large check to RMU under these unpredictable conditions is a risky thing. After some discussion regarding the state of donations towards the raffle (we are ahead of the pace thanks to the 2020 Convention donations), Frank called for a straw vote. Those present were in favor of cancelling the Jamboree. At that point, Andy Blenko formally moved to cancel the 2021 Jamboree. The motion was seconded by Tom Gaus and passed by majority voice vote.

Flyer: Patrick Altdorfer was not present - no report.

Treasurer: Jeff Gregg was not present, but Frank Benders reported that the division is solvent. Andy Blenko reported that the Convention account is solvent and nearly dormant.

Programs: Andy Blenko reported that the Division was hoping to meet at Venetia, but the landlord has prohibited all gatherings of more than 25 people. Therefore, that is cancelled. He will investigate the Norwin Public Library for October, but is unaware that it is even open.

Company Store: Susan reported that she has orders for four more books.

Membership: Tom Gaus reported the membership at 204; apparently membership drops off in the summer or members forget to renew. Tom will send a reminder e-mail to the membership to renew.

Website: Tom announced that the website is up to date.

Free-Mo: Patrick Altdorfer was not present so no report.

Bring-N-Brag: Arley Mitchell announced that there were just three entries. He is very concerned with the low number of votes -12.

Video Library: Bud Brock was not present, so there was no report.

Achievement Program: Dennis announced that Susan Werner had earned a Merit Award for her engine house. A Golden Spike, Volunteer, and Scenery certificates have been applied for and are awaiting confirmation by the Region.

Regarding convention kits, Dennis reported that sales of HO & N buildings had abruptly ceased. There have been no inquiries for four weeks. An article reviewing the N scale signal tower kit is expected in the next three to four months in either the *NMRA Magazine* or *Railroad Model Craftsman*. The reviewer has been sent the kit for this purpose.

T-Trak: Jimmy Braum announced that there are 12 members in the Facebook T-Trak group. He has completed another module. When the COVID-19 situation permits another train show, he hopes everyone will be able to see it.

Jimmy raised the possibility of having a trip to the East Broad Top Railroad instead of the Division picnic (he is going to talk

to them in November or December). Neal Schorr recommended that Jimmy conduct a survey in the *Keystone Flyer* or on the website to gauge interest first – it's a long way to drive. Jimmy also announced that the EBT ran its first train in 9 years this weekend. Their season begins May 2021. Neal thought the excursion might be best done as an "extra fare" trip.

MCR 2023 Convention: Keith DeVault reported that Frank Benders and he recently visited the DoubleTree hotel in Cranberry. He very much likes the facility, which has 6,700 more square feet of convention space than the Greentree Double-Tree. Total space for the Cranberry site would be 18,000 sq. feet vs 8,838 sq. feet at Greentree. Frank, Susan, and Mike Hohn received an e-mail from Jim Sacco (who had been tasked to speak with his contacts at the Greentree Double Tree). The e-mail verified some of the hotel's issues, which caused difficulties with the convention. Grier indicated that other sources have independently confirmed problems with the running of the hotel.

The name of the 2023 Convention will be "Rails to Pittsburgh" and it will be held May 4, 5, 6, and 7. The contract is to be signed on Monday. "Rivers of Steel" is being pursued as one of the three tours during the Convention. Their private tours begin on May 1st of each year. The coal mine has not yet been contacted. The Trolley Museum conducts private tours beginning on the 1st of April each year. Mike Hohn noted Keith's excellent work and the teamwork of the committee in making significant progress well ahead of schedule.

Old Business: None.

<u>New Business:</u> Frank reported that the NMRA National and Regional leadership have directed the Division to incorporate the NMRA 'At Risk Policy' into the Division's constitution. He asked for a volunteer to oversee that activity. Andy Blenko volunteered to investigate the necessary steps. A vigorous discussion ensued as to whether the policy belonged in the Bylaws or the Constitution. Dennis indicated that the policy might be too variable for the Constitution and might be better suited for the Bylaws. Susan indicated that changes to the Constitution were difficult to make. Frank reiterated that National and Regional want the policy in the Constitution. We await the result of Andy's investigation.

Concerns & Questions – There were none from the member-ship.

For the Good of the Division:

Tom Gaus volunteered to give Susan an e-mail with photos of the Bring-N-Brag entries in advance of the next contest in an effort to stimulate voting. Susan noted that she will send out photos of the winners shortly after Arley provides the results.

With business concluded, Frank asked for a motion to adjourn. Dennis moved to adjourn with Susan seconding. The meeting was adjourned at 3:37 PM.



A Message From The Jamboree Committee

It was with great reluctance that we recommended to the Executive Committee that the April, 2021 Model Railroad Jamboree be cancelled. After a discussion it was voted to cancel.

As we began the preliminary planning several weeks ago, it quickly became apparent that government Covid-19 restrictions placed on Robert Morris University for events would be virtually impossible to overcome. Also, at this time the uncertainties of not knowing what restrictions will or will not be in place next spring made holding the event very suspect. We did not want a Jamboree that would not meet our normal high standards.

So let's hope the entire world can get back to "normal" soon and in 2022 the Jamboree will go on.
