
- 1) Set-up Crew: 3-4 folks to handle table set-up, garbage bags, utensils, prepare the grill, and basically get the party started.

# Bring'n'Brag



The May Bring 'n' Brag category was **Freight Cars** and this brought out seven(!) entries.

**First place** went to **Mike DeSensi** for his N scale Santa Fe reefer car. He models the year 1945 in N scale, and his starting point for this model was an Intermountain SFRD model, from which he removed the molded doors and replaced them with doors he scratch-built from styrene. He also added a floor and walls, weathered metal wheelsets, and Z scale couplers, then weathered the model with Pan Pastels.

**Second place** went to **Denny Lippert** for his collection of five diverse freight cars, which he described as having just "popped from the shop," including a Rapido SP waffle boxcar, an Athearn WM centerflow hopper, a Proto-2000 PC flatcar (which he custom-painted), a Branchline 50ft PRR boxcar (which he painted after modifiying the sills), and a new Walthers P2K 40ft boxcar.

**Third place** went to to **Bob DiBenedetto** for his collection of three loaded RailGons in various levels of weathering. Two of them featured scrap metal cubes, and one featured banded steel plates.

Four additional models were entered into the contest this month; two of which comprised steel coil cars.





**Rick Montgomery** entered a pair of coil cars (left), one depicting the car after it had just been re-shopped, and the other soon after it was put back into service (he added State tool and die coil cradles and US Steel coils), heavily weathered the car with Pan Pastels and Testors paint markers, and added graffiti (Blair Line decals) to give it the modern touch.

**Vinny Kaplack** entered a CSX Cushion Coil Car (cover photo), which was a Walthers HO scale kit from the early 2000s, to which he added metal wheels, Kadee couplers, and the steel coil load. He finished the model by weathering it using three different techniques: airbrush, powders, and chalks.

**Richard Reichenbach** brought an Erie TOFC

with trailer advertising the "Piggy-Back Service," weathered to resemble a prototype photo he also displayed with the car.



# LINKS AND PINS

Some readers may recall that a few years back, during the darkest days of the Covid-19 pandemic, when many of us were stuck at home with not much to do but reflect on the sorry state of the world, we found a bright spot in the prose of the intrepid mid-century railroad reporter I.C. Dimmley and his history of the Huntingdon Northern Railway, and his now well-known expose of the infamous management tactics for which its Director of Operations, Bob Prehoda, is known across the model railroading branch! That five-part series ran in *The Keystone Flyer* from July to November 2020, and it was a great diversion for this editor and for the contributor (Bob), and I hope it was also for the readers.

Last week, I had occasion to speak by phone with Bud Brock, O scale modeler and Video Library chair, who regularly shares by email with me and with others tidbits of railroad prototype and modeling interest he has culled during years of scouring the internet. At his request — and in line with my own solicitation of content for this newsletter — going forward I am dedicating space in the Keystone Flyer for this new column as a place for members to share what they have learned from the increasingly wide variety of internet and/or social media sources we are using now — be it Facebook, YouTube, Pinterest, Reddit, or plain old websites you have stumbled upon on your digital discovery.

How often this column appears will depend on your participation and sharing of information. But to kick off the current column, these are some of the links that Bud asked to be shared with the readers as a way to learn more about the railroad industry and the model railroading hobby. One caveat, or word of caution (from the Editor): Enjoy these in moderation, because getting sucked into the rabbit hole will keep you from getting back to modeling and railfanning!

- <u>Why do Railroads not need expansion joints?</u> A video explainer about Continuous Welded Rail
- A video Exploring Pittsburgh's ABANDONED Light Rail Stations
- Videos from the YouTube page of "Movie Miniatures Effects," a group that uses scale models to recreate famous movie scenes, including the train crashes as seen in <u>Mission Impossible 7</u> or <u>Under Siege 2</u>
- "This Week/Weekend in PRR History" is an online forum (subscribe here: <a href="mailto:prrlineswest@groups.io">prrlineswest@groups.io</a>) for Pennsy fans that provides interesting information from PRR history, such as the suggestion that the word "caboose" was originally a nautical term defined as "a house on deck where cooking is done..." which may be why they are known as "Crummies;" or that on June 9, 1927, the PRR announces it will rename its passenger train "The St. Louisian/New Yorker" to "The Spirit of St. Louis" in honor of Charles Lindbergh's flight across the Atlantic. One of the observation cars will be named "Colonel Lindbergh."

Coda: As we talked, Bud also suggested that we institute a printed column that complements the discussion topic that Superintendent Coglianese instigated as an agenda item at our regular meetings: "What's on your Workbench?" I found this to be a good idea, and that is another column that you may see here in the future, pending reader contributions. Bud submitted an idea for the first installment of this column as well, and I look forward to seeing his contribution on On30 trucks fleshed out for presentation in a future issue!
