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# From the Super's Desk

### A QUESTION OF SCALE

What scale do you model? There are two ways you can read this question, the most obvious: are you an N, HO, S, O, or large-scale modeler? We often confuse "scale" with "gauge" and neither is what I intend here.

One online dictionary (www.thefreedictionary.com) lists many definitions for the word "scale." I'm looking at the one several down on the list:

- 1. A system of ordered marks at fixed intervals used as a reference standard in measurement
- 2. A proportion used in determining the dimensional relationship of a representation to that which it represents
- 3. A progressive classification, as of size, amount, importance, or rank . . .
  - 4. A relative level or degree

Vagel Keller (412) 441-7881 vckeller@comcast.net We've all seen small layouts where every square inch is detailed. Buildings are built board-by-board; people are everywhere; locomotives have lots of rivets; everything is weathered. Lots of trees, constructed individually. Handlaid track with scratch built turnouts. Scene after scene, separated by a high trestle with all the necessary nut-bolt-washer castings. Narrow-gauge payouts often fit this mold, portraying logging lines through eastern forests or 3-foot gold- and silver-hauling trains struggling through deep Colorado canyons and across sun-scorched wastelands . . . sort of how my lawn and garden look these days. The degree of detail within a single square foot is very high.

At the other end, modelers with a lot of space and a vision of a busy major road build large layouts with long trains, staging yards that rival the narrow-gauge layouts in sheer feet of sectional track, and several to many towns. Although some of these rail empires sport hand-laid track and turnouts, most must depend on already-built turnouts—or a crew of talented friends—to complete the layout in a reasonable time. To see the same level of detail as the first type, you have to consider several square feet of layout.

I've seen O-scale layouts only a couple of feet deep and perhaps twenty feet in length, but they are packed with detail. The scale of construction is very small dimensionally, measured better in inches than feet. Individual cars and structures make up the basic unit of measure on such a layout. Look for removable roofs and interior details, although you might do best to stay out of the privy, or at least don't look through the half-open door.

At the opposite end, the basic unit is a city block or strings of ready-to-roll cars. You might stop and look at details every foot along the front of the first kind of layout, while you tend to keep walking along the the second type to see around the loop at the far end of a peninsula. One modeler buys rolling stock by the half-dozen while another laborious builds, paints, letters, and weathers a single car every six months. Both can construct a jaw-dropping

# Bring'n'Brag

June's Bring 'n' Brag contest was held at the Westinghouse Park Shelter in Point Breeze, Pittsburgh, PA. "Gondolas" was the contest category this month, and there were six entries.

Steve Ross won first place with his two HO scale 52' Gondolas by receiving 11 of the 22 votes cast. His first model of B&O gondola 350235 was built from a MDC kit. He added jacking pads out of styrene, applied COTS stencil decals over the factory painted lettering, replaced the wheel sets with P2K metal wheels, added KD couplers and weathered the car with Bragdon's powder. His second car painted and lettered for Conrail was built from a Proto 2000 kit. He reworked the factory painted reweigh data with a Sharpie marker and added U-1 wheel stencil decals. He also replaced the wheel sets, added KD couplers and weathered the car with Bragdon's powders. Finally he roughed up the wooden floor and added artist oil highlights to the flat gray base coat.

Second place went to Joel Eberly for a set of three HO scale gondolas lettered for his home road, the A&J Railroad. Joel's models received 5 votes. His first car was built from an Ambroid kit and included LCL containers. His second car was a composite side model built from an AHM kit and painted and lettered for his home road. His third car was built from an Athearn kit and included canisters made from old Flash Cubes.

Third place voting ended in a tie between Andy Lorince and Dennis Williams with two votes received by each entrant. Andy entered a set of S-scale BNSF bathtub gons made by S-Scale America along with a depressed center flat and two other gondola cars. Dennis entered a pair of HO scale gondolas made from Resin kits, one by Sunshine and one by Westerfield.

Other entries for June's contest included:

Bill DeFoe entered a pair of HO scale gondolas made from old Mantua models. He replaced the stirrup steps with brass, repainted them with Scalecoat paints, and lettered them with dry transfers and decals.

Dennis Vaccaro entered a scratchbuilt HOn30 20 ton MOW gondola. He built it from styrene and self made urethane castings.

Thanks to everyone who brought in models and voted. The next contest will be in August at the annual summer picnic at Henley Park located in Leetsdale, PA where the modeling category will be "Diesel Power."



#### Division 2 at Boy Scout Advancement Camp


