From the Super's Desk A Moving Experience: Operations

Operations have been on my mind the last couple of weeks. First, our club has an op session one Saturday. Then I visit Bob Prehoda's layout before our Division's monthly business meeting; I'll always associate Bob

with operations. The following week I write a description of the scheme I use for governing freight car movements to put up on my website.* Then I receive the latest NMRA magazine and find that the theme is operating your model railroad.

I suspect operations scare a lot of people off. It can seem so serious. From time to time colleagues have commented on my apparent calmness while under fire. I have a confession to make: some layouts give me the heebie jeebies just to think about. Consequently, as the bard wrote: Discretion is the better part of valor.

Yet, the op session at our club ran smoothly and consequently was very enjoyable. We really had too few

Nevertheless, we did run several timetable trains in addition to a couple or more turns. I don't know how long the session ran because I was one of those who had to leave before it ended, having a painting project going on at home. Within minutes of showing up I was given a passenger train to run from one end of the layout to the other, obeying the timetable as I went. I like Class 1 trains: everybody has to get out of the way.

Then I ran a turn from our main yard to the little town of Ella Mae (or is it Ellamae?). I asked for the switchlist. No switchlist. Through trains had been set up in staging during our regular Thursday evening meeting two days earlier, but there was no time to write up switchlists. So, the drill was to pick up pretty much all the cars at the half-dozen industry tracks at Ellamae and replace them with the same kind of cars. A boxcar for a boxcar, hopper for hopper, and so forth. I finished the job reasonably efficiently, despite the fact that in a moment of complete absent-mindedness I ran right through Ellamae to Junior, and had to retrace my route. Since I did not want to back the train that distance, I switched motive power and caboose and got that job over with. There were so few trains out on the mainline I don't think anybody noticed what I'd done.

I asked for and received clearance to return to the yard, stopped at the yard limits to find out from the yardmaster where to park my train, brought it in on the arrival track, uncoupled the locomotive (an RS-1), ran it to an appropriate spot in the engine terminal, cleaned out my coffee mug, and went home after a few good byes. I was in the perfect mood to pick up a brush and get to work on that ceiling. Didn't fall off the ladder either.

The key to the success of that particular op session was flexibility and experience. It does help to know a layout and to run on it with some regularity. Having a number of options for running the layout is important also. Running


John also reported that he is continuing his offer to PHOTOGRAPH any models that are brought for Bring N Brag, and had a session after the business meeting.

Bring'n'Brag

September's Bring 'n' Brag contest was held at The Norwin Public Library in Irwin, PA. The contest model theme this month was Built Laser Kits, and eight entries were submitted.

First place was won by Marge Meehan whose models received 14 of the 34 votes cast. She entered two N scale dioramas both built using Laser kit structures. The first was an Army barracks compound and the second was a pickle brining works. Most of the structures were made of laser cut printed paperboard.

Voting for second place gave Dick Flock the win with 6 votes received. Dick entered a collection of six HO scale laser kit buildings. One of his buildings was the Div. 2 MCR Convention Laser Kit B&O pumphouse that was featured in the September 2012 Keystone Flyer, while another one had an interior kitbashed out of lego pieces.

Third place was won by Mike Hohn for his collection of HO scale laser kit boxcars. Mike received 5 votes. Four of his kits were built from modified B.T.S. kits while his ventilated boxcar was an Alkem kit.

Robert Hickman entered two of the Monroe Models B&O pumphouse kits built as a single long building.

Steve Ross entered his HO scale B&O pumphouse painted in 1950's era B&O colors of buff with black trim and a grey slate roof. He added a styrene concrete base and weathered it with Bragdon's powders.

Dennis Lippert entered his HO scale B&O pumphouse painted as a CSX MOW shed in overall light grey.


