

# From the Super's Desk

I happened to stop at a hobby store a few weeks ago to see what the store carries in HO scale. The model railroad hobby, as you know, now isn't an inexpensive hobby. The difference between when I started some 50 years ago, and now, is the availability of a good box kit to put together, and an out-of-the-box,

ready to run on the layout. Cost once amortized over time, because we had to build more than buy, made hobby expenditures less dramatic, if not less expensive. If you are going to build a large layout in your basement, a size more prevalent today than in the past and again easier to do because of the products available which makes it more achievable, you already know you've committed yourself to a good size financial investment.

There are, of course, enjoyable alternatives in the hobby. Among the most popular are the modules. With the module system you have the standard 2 feet by 4 feet sections, which can be built to accommodate other people's track plans. This allows many people to join your system and be able to run trains. Modules give you a full operating layout, but which can be broken down and transported.

As long as they're capable of interfacing at each end, the track plan can deviate between scenes, providing a good operational plan. The standard modules can be built either in sectionals, to join with those of other people, or you can build them for your pleasure to be part of your own layout. In either case, they can be broken down and transported if you need to move.

As most of you are aware, basements can be different sizes, and we as modelers can be handicapped by space constraints, budget of time, and other factors. With the above options, you can still showcase your own work and have fun running trains. With the new (I say new, but it has been around a while) "T-Track" (Table Top) system, you build a layout section small enough to carry under your arm, and with this you can build lots of sections, or work with some friends and just find a table and hook up the sections and start to run trains. This system is very popular for kids, as they can build and run trains at a low cost. This system, I believe, will find us some young people to get into this hobby for many years to come.

Another to the above systems is the shelf layout. You can build this on a wall, and this usually involves a point-to-point operating scheme. In the long run, if space handicaps you, this could be the answer. Faster completion, easier maintenance, and scenes with greater detail are just some of the assets of this system. So, in other words, if you enjoy model railroading as much as I do, there is no reason you can't have something in your own home or apartment.

I would like to finish up my column to say Thank You. This is to Frank and Jan Benders for the great work on the picnic. This is also for Tom Gaus as the Grill Master, and to everyone else who helped out in setting up the tables, etc. And to all of the individuals that joined us in the afternoon of good food, fellowship and lots of trains. I think we counted over a dozen trains that passed us from noon to 3 o'clock. Think about joining us next year, as John Gallagher has volunteered to coordinate with the park people for the third Sunday of August in 2019.

# Alden McBee

The August Bring-n-Brag, whose theme was structures, had eight entries, all outstanding.

First place went to Joel Everly for his Fenster's Farm Market. This was a slightly modified Bar Mills kit with additional Woodland Scenic figures and details.

There was a tie for second place. Mike Hohn's entry was a completely scratch-built coal trestle and coal gondola. The other second place entry was Alden McBee's scratch-built B&O MK tower, the prototype standing in Rowlesburg, WV from 1954 until 2011.



Third place was Neal Schorr's kitbashed O scale Hotel Royal (left). The prototype was built in Port Royal, PA around 1909. The model was created by heavily reworking a toy-like Lionel O'Grady's Tavern. This involved complete disassembly, adding a large front porch, repainting, adding mortar, and adding additional details from Ameritowne Models and doll

house parts.

Other entries included Neal Schorr's kitbashed lighted row structures for Port Royal, PA (right).







Tied for 2nd place were two scratchbuilt models of prototype structures: (left) Alden McBee's B&O MK Tower, located in Rowlesburg, WV and depicted here ca. 1978; and (top) Mike Hohn's coal trestle and gondola.

Jim Braum's scratch-built W&LE Valley Inn

viaduct (right) was constructed from styrene and balsa wood using handdrawn blueprints, has fully correct interior bracing, and was tested and can support an HO scale locomotive and



cars. Jim also brought his PRR Shire Oaks yard caboose ser-

vicing facility, which was a GC Laser kit. Both were very nicely painted and weathered.

Dennis Vacarro's HO fire hose shed (left) was modelled with the doors open, showing the fire hoses and hydrant details.

For display only was Bud Brock's bolt and nail storage building without the roof

attached showing the rafter construction.

Thanks to all those who brought models. Obviously a lot of thought and work went into all of these.

The company is located at 177 Curry Street, Minerva, OH 44657.



## **October 21 Meeting : Norwin Public Library**

After the meeting, **Charlie Blenko** will present "Discovering the Abandoned Manor Branch." Writes Charlie: "The PRR Manor Branch will be examined as a case study in how traces of old, abandoned branch lines can still be seen today through field trips and aerial mapping. Various research techniques will yield a trove of interesting information on this small branch. The branch's modeling and operational potential will also be studied. The ideas shown in this presentation can be applied to any number of prototypes and railroads."

## **Three Layouts open in October!**

Get out to the Irwin area by 11am this month to get a look at three outstanding layouts before the meeting starts. All three layouts are oriented toward operations, and they all incorporate familiar themes of our region's geography and industries. They are also in various stages of "maturity," if you will, ranging from Bob Prehoda's completed Huntingdon Northern Railroad, a freelanced operation set in 1962, whose tightwad management still employs aging steam locomotives as it tries to hold its own traversing the valleys between Pittsburgh and Cumberland, and interchanging with all of the big roads you know in this region (PRR, B&O, WM). At the next stage of completion, you can see Andy and Charlie Blenko's Pittsburgh Mainline, which takes spectators and operators into the Conrailera of intermodal freight traffic along some of the most solid benchwork, electronics, and mechanics you will see in the hobby. Scenery is starting to take shape on this layout as well, and you will see some fine applications of the latest scenery techniques, including the use of photo-backdrops and backdrop façade structures to provide depth where walls inevitably place limits on our ability to represent larger spaces and areas. Finally, the "youngest" railroad on the block will be open for the first time this month: Kevin Sapanara is building the CP&D, which models the Chessie System between Connellsville and Pittsburgh on two levels. All three layouts are HO scale, and they will be open from 11am to 2pm before the meeting, and possibly after the meeting pending interest.

They decided to eliminate the loop due to the inability to haul it around. At the moment they have four 4' modules. He expressed doubt that the modules would be ready for the November show. Keith DeVault suggested and then made a motion that we skip the November show and spend our efforts to get ready for the January show (will be held very early in 2019). Frank Benders seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously by voice vote.

Bring N' Brag: Alden McBee reported that there were 9 entries with 1 for display only. Please vote.

Video Library: Bud Brock reported that the conversion to CD-ROM is nearly complete.

Achievement Program: Dennis Vaccaro did not have anything to report for the AP, but did note that the building kits for the convention were for sale, particularly the O-scale and S-scale oil houses. Instructions and photos for all 4 buildings are on the web and PayPal will soon be an option. He yielded the floor to Gary Kohler of Portland Locomotive Works who reported that his company is planning to construct a 2rail O-scale layout on the premises and would eventually like to have the Division visit again. Portland Locomotive Works will be at the O Scale National Convention in Rockville, MD later this week and the O-scale signal tower will be on display. He expects to have the HO telegraph office kit available soon. One offering of all four buildings is in production right now. He is waiting on drawings to get the others going. He will have 4 buildings in production in 4 scales simultaneously.
