

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

Minutes

November 15, 2020 Business Meeting

The special virtual executive meeting was gaveled open by Superintendent Frank Benders at 2:32 PM. He thanked Dennis Vaccaro for hosting the meeting via GoToMeeting.

Present: Patrick Altdorfer, Frank Benders, Andy Blenko, Jimmy Braum, Dennis Coglianese, Keith DeVault, Tom Gaus, Jeff Gregg, Mike Hohn, Richie Jodon, Grier Kuehn, Arley Mitchell, George Pandelios, Neal Schorr, Dennis Vaccaro, Susan Werner, Jim Whipple.

Prior to the start of business topic discussions Frank noted the passing of Dick Flock and recognized his positive influence, calling him "the sparkplug of the division." Dick was a strong promoter of the RPM meets. He will be missed.

Dennis Vaccaro proposed that Pass-the-Hat could be done virtually using PayPal, which is available on the Division website. Dennis Coglianese indicated that PayPal could be used to transfer money a number of ways (using Credit Cards requires a transaction fee). Dennis Vaccaro stated that a set of buttons (\$2, \$5, \$10) could be created that members could easily just click. Pay-Pal would probably cost \$0.30 / instance + 2.9% transaction fee; it is probable that the Division would not qualify for the Friends & Family category, i.e. free. Susan Werner asked if we actually needed the income, given that the Keystone Flyer is now an online publication and that meeting venues do not need to be paid for (donations made to the hosting organization or facility). Dennis indicated that GoToMeeting costs the Division \$20/month or just \$15/month if we did a yearly contract. The general consensus was that, at least for the foreseeable future, an online Pass-The-Hat was not necessary.

An additional and vigorous discussion ensued regarding the various advantages and disadvantages of Zoom and GoToMeeting. The costs of both products were compared (they are comparable). The consensus of the group was that Zoom was more sophisticated and might be more useful for larger groups such as an entire division meeting. Frank asked Andy to meet with Joe Birsa, Dennis Coglianese, and Jim Whipple and come up with a set of recommendations for either Zoom or GoToMeeting as a tool for the Division. He was asked to report prior to the January meeting.

The minutes of the October meeting were accepted as published in *Keystone Flyer* online by acclamation with Susan Werner proposing the motion and Richie Jodon seconding it.

Committee Reports:

Flyer: Patrick Altdorfer indicated that the new Flyer came out the other day. He reported that the submission deadline for next issue is 12/20. The Flyer will run the obituary for Don Flock; Patrick asked for any additional information. There will be a link to the published obituary in the online *Greensburg Tribune-Review*. He asked Tom Gaus to place the link on the website.

Richie Jodon asked when Flyer ads were due? Patrick responded that January 1st. Neal Schorr asked about Pike ads. They are \$15 / year. Please send payment to Jeff Gregg by January 1st. Patrick proposed running Dick Flock's ad for another year (in memoriam notation and the removal of contact information). The proposal passed unanimously by acclimation.

Treasurer: Jeff Gregg reported that the division is solvent. Andy Blenko reported no activity in the Convention account.

Programs: Andy Blenko doesn't believe the Division will be holding an in-person meeting until late Spring at the earliest. He is attempting to get Scenic Express to host a meeting perhaps in January or later in the Spring. Mike Hohn indicated that their facility is larger and might allow for social distancing.

A discussion of the attendance and venue regarding the Greenberg Show ensued. Reports indicated that at times people were obeying the rules and at other times disregarding the crowd size limitations.

Company Store: Susan reported that book sales are on-going. She published a new list and there has been some interest. She asked Tom to put the list of books on the division website.

Membership: Tom Gaus reported that we have 206 members. E-mails to dormant members have been sent.

Website: Tom reported that the website is up to date.

Free-Mo: Patrick Altdorfer reported Free-Mo is dormant. He did not put in for the Greenberg Show, and with COVID-19 cases increasing, he doubts there will be another show any time soon.

Bring-N-Brag: This time around there was some confusion as to the voting deadline for Bring-N-Brag. Arley Mitchell also indicated that he is a bit frustrated with the low number of voters. Neal Schorr indicated that voting might be enhanced by opening up the online meeting to the members. Arley reiterated that the submission deadline for B-N-B should be the Saturday 1 week prior to the meeting. Voting will begin the next day (Sunday) with the deadline being the Saturday before the meeting. Susan will send an e-mail advising the membership of the new deadlines and encouraging them to vote. She will use the e-mail Tom created which has a link to the website to view Bring-N-Brag entries.

Video Library: Bud Brock was not present so there was no report.

Achievement Program: Dennis reported that there have been no new submissions, but one member is working on a Structures Certificate. He sent Tom Gaus a synopsis of the remote judging to put on the website, and he is asking Patrick to also put this in the Flyer. The process is very simple; send your

paperwork to Dennis or Susan. They will determine a way to do the judging either by video or in person. Susan emphasized that the paperwork for judging is not an option and must be submitted. It was her view that the best way to judge models was in person. Dennis agreed but indicated that remote judging by video is working in Alaska and in Montana and that we should be willing to try it as well given the state of the pandemic.

T-Trak: Richie Jodon reported that there is no activity for T-Trak other than members working on their modules at home. However, he did recommend that members visit YouTube and search for "Next Generation X" to see some clinics on scratch-building. Richie has taken photos of the T-Trak modules and is sending them into the T-Trak Group for a virtual tour on YouTube. There were 240 attendees. He also reported that Kato is holding a T-Trak contest on Twitter. You take a photo and send it in; Kato is giving away a large number of prizes.

Jimmy Braum reported that as soon as it is safe, he plans to do a presentation on T-Trak for the DARE Club in Venetia, PA. He thinks that would be a great opportunity to get kids involved.

Jamboree: Grier Kuehn reported no news as the event is on hold for a year.

MCR 2023 Convention: Keith DeVault was present but there was nothing new to report.

Old Business: Last month, Keith volunteered to ask the NMRA legal representative about the applicability of "At Risk Policy" to family members bringing their grandchildren to NMRA meetings, e.g. Grier's grandson. He reported that the NMRA Legal representative wants to speak to the NMRA Board of Directors first about this as it constitutes a big liability to the organization. The next BOD meeting is scheduled for mid-January. Until that time, everything is on hold.

New Business: Frank raised the issue of a Zoom Primer. Frank attended a meeting on the capabilities of Zoom. Present also were Joe Birsa, Jim Whipple, and Dennis Coglianese. Frank asked Jim to give his opinion of the meeting. Jim indicated that he liked the Zoom Chat box. Susan indicated that GoToMeeting also has this capability. Mike Hohn indicated

that the Chat box could be used to send links for Pass-The-Hat types of donations. Frank tasked Joe Birsa, Jim Whipple and Dennis Coglianese to meet and determine which technology is best suited for the division. Andy is tasked to coordinate this effort.

Concerns & Questions: Susan reported that nothing had come in to her. She did note however that the NMRA is doing another virtual mini-convention on Facebook/YouTube. Everyone should have gotten an e-mail announcing this. Check out the NMRA Facebook page and join – you will see these announcements. The NMRA will run clinics on Tuesday, December 1st from 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM. This will be a recurring event.

For the Good of the Division:

Grier noted that Jim Sacco recently had a minor follow-up medical procedure related to the major procedure he underwent 3 years ago. Grier was happy to report that it went well. Jim is back home and doing well.

Dennis Vaccaro indicated no further building sales had occurred. However, he has sold out of the HO tower. He cannot order more because the producer, Gary Kohler came down with the Covid-19 virus. He is doing well, but Dennis will delay ordering new buildings until January. Dennis also asked if there was any place to make a donation in Dick Flock's memory. Susan indicated no – there was nothing in the obituary. She reported that there will be no viewing, but a celebration of his life is being planned for the spring.

Jimmy Braum reported that last week the East Broad Top Railroad performed a test run of a steam locomotive's running gear (no steam). They are expecting to have a full tourism schedule for 2021 and steam back on the EBT by late 2021, 2022 for sure.

Frank noted that the next Division meeting will be January 17, 2021.

With business concluded, Frank adjourned the meeting at 3:33 PM.

Status of 2021 conventions, meetings, etc. still uncertain

With the pandemic still not behind us, a lot is still up in the air about when we will again be able to safely meet in person. - As noted on page 7, the 2021 NMRA Regional Convention (Mid Central Region—Northern Express), previously scheduled for May 20-23, 2021, has been cancelled. For updates check in with the <u>Division 12 website</u>.
- Our Division Two Jamboree (typically scheduled for April) is also on hold for now; updates will be known in the Flyer and on the <u>Division 2 website</u>.




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NEWS AROUND THE HOBBY

Scenic Express moving to Colorado

In the Bad News / Good News department, Past Superintendent Keith DeVault had occasion to visit recently with our friend Jim Elster and hear about future plans for Scenic Express, his Delmont-based model railroad scenery products company. We have all come to rely upon Jim and his company, and perhaps we have been a bit spoiled, having him near us all these years. Certainly we have been fortunate to enjoy his hospitality as he hosted one of our Division meetings each year. Unfortunately for Jim, he was not able to find a buyer for the business, but fortunately for us in the modeling community, he has decided to keep the business in operation, despite his plans to relocate to Colorado this summer. Future space considerations will require some downsizing of the business, but many products will continue to be available online (view catalog here), and hopefully once we can all travel again, those of us who make a railfanning pilgrimage to Colorado may be able to visit him (again) one day.

In the mean time, one way you can help Jim out — and yourself in the process — is to <u>order by May 2021</u> the scenery material, structure kits, details, or modeling tools and supplies you may still need to complete (or finally start!) your layout, modules, and dioramas. This could help him to reduce the amount of inventory he needs to take with him as he moves operations this summer.

Rod Stewart Layout Brexits America

According to the (UK) *Daily Mail* newspaper, world renowned model railroader Rod Stewart has moved his massive 23' x 124' "Three Rivers City" layout permanently from his Beverly Hills attic back to his Essex home, where he has been quarantining for the pandemic since April 2020. Mr. Stewart, who funds his hobbies and palimony by moonlighting as a singer, says that he shipped his layout last fall and planned to have it "up and running after Christmas." Rumors are the layout will be reassembled in a shed in the back yard of his multi-million pound Sheering estate (or perhaps in the carriage house attic, above his Ferraris and other 1:1 toys). The HO scale layout, which depicts a 1940s American big city (though NOT Pittsburgh, apparently, despite the interesting fictitious name he gave it), took 23 years to complete and features Code 70 flextrack and Digitrax DCC control. You can read more about his modeling in four feature articles published in *Model Railroader* (December 2007, December 2010, February 2014, and June 2017), as well as in some of the British model railroad press (*Railway Modeller*, December 2019; *Continental Modeller*, January 2020).

If you want to learn more Mr. Stewart's side hustle, be forewarned: his railroad-oriented songs are limited to but two covers: "People Get Ready" by Curtis Mayfield and "Downtown Train" by Tom Waits. You can probably find these on those older cassette tapes or LPs that are gathering dust in your attic or mold in your basement. Or you can go to your local record store or CD shop and buy an album. If you are young (under age 40), you probably have no idea what I am talking about, so just sit back on your sofa and yell, "Alexa: Play songs by Rod Stewart!"

Guinness Book of World Records: Chocolate Train

Bud shared this trivia tidbit that he recently stumbled across in his travels through the dark underbelly of the internet forums: the world's longest chocolate structure, <u>certified by the Guinness Book</u> in November 2012, was actually



a (model) train. This was created in Malta by chef Andrew Ferrugia and his pastry team and transported to Brussels, Belgium, where it was assembled at South Station. It measures almost 34m (112 feet) and weighs 1,285kg (2,755 pounds), and



it took some 784 hours to create. You can read more about this delicious diversion here.

Achievement Program: Remote Model Evaluation

Div.2 Remote Model Evaluation

This guideline is based on an Email from Frank Koch, NMRA AP Manager on remote model judging.

Judging is certainly more challenging during COVID, but most NMRA Divisions are using some form of Distant Evaluation that has historically been used to serve our members who geographically live far away from a population center and find it difficult to have in person evaluations. The NMRA has been doing this for about five years in some of our more remote areas like the far reaches of Canada, Alaska, Montana, Nebraska, and Mexico.

The approach takes one of several forms:

- A team visits the home and, while practicing social distancing and other safe processes, does an in person evaluation either in the home or on a patio or on a car hood or some other safer environment. Even in the home, limit the number of people and stay apart. (Ex: Anchorage from Seattle, Dallas to Mexico City, and the Maritime Provinces of Canada to New York).
- Teams of evaluators will assemble in a large open central space and evaluate a whole bunch of models at once like in a contest. Frank has done this successfully as he has access to a very large hall where it can be done while maintaining safe conditions.
- 3. Using video or photographs and a virtual evaluation. This works well for eight of the certificates. Four certificates Prototype Models, Motive Power, Cars, and Structures can be evaluated via videos or ZOOM/GoToMeeting or other interactive means with several caveats. All the documentation needs to be prepared by the modeler and forwarded to the evaluators before the evaluation. The "video" is VERY subject to the skill and quality of the submitter's videography. We have drawn several conclusions after about five years of testing:

The procedure is fairly consistent if the model scores very high or very low - clearly Merit or clearly not Merit. It lacks consistency in the range of 80-95 points, the critical area for determining a Merit Award. For models in this range, we typically require some sort of in person evaluation to quantify the score and determine if the model is of Merit quality. The reality is that most folks do not have the skills or equipment (lighting, focus, general appearance) to allow a good evaluation via video alone.

There have been models go both ways in the MCR Region. Some scored much higher in person and some went the other way. There is no substitute for in person evaluations in most cases. If you see a model that is clearly over 95 points or one that is clearly under 80 points, the answer is clear. The middle ground is more difficult.

For Civil, Scenery, and Electrical, video or photographs plus the documentation works fine. for Civil, a video showing a powered locomotive traversing the routes is sufficient with the other documentation. Since Scenery requires photos anyway, and the evaluation is more qualitative and not really quantitative, it can be done virtually.

The most interesting example so far of "distant evaluation" was an event in a large hall (and one in a parking lot) where everyone signed up in advance, put their models in a specific area, then backed off to be safely away. The evaluators had previewed the documentation, the evaluations took place, and the evaluators could ask questions of the distant modelers. It worked well.
