
There were eight entries in the contest this month, all of which were such good and interesting submissions, it was difficult to choose (which may be why there was a tie for 2nd place).

First Place went to Ray Helster, who submitted a very large, framed photograph of the colorful B&P GP9s pulling a tanker train across the wooden trestle at Chicora, PA (detail below). Talk about mixing modern and legacy images! This one looks as if it is on a model railroad already: shiny diesels, fresh out of the box, cross over a ramshackle, weather-beaten (Campbell kit?) trestle. Neither my nor Ray's "photo of the photo" do justice to the original image depicted, but the cropped image gives some idea of the original framed print.

Grier Kuehn and Neal Schorr tied for <u>Second Place</u>. Grier submitted a photo of a weathered tank car (featured on the cover page) that he snapped at Rook Yard last February. Neal brought a stunning image (above right) of an NS train he photographed as it crossed the Rockville Bridge.

Other contest entries (pictured on page 9 below) were submitted by Jimmy Braum (an EBT doodlebug getting a new roof), Don Coulter (a Conrail business car), and George Pandelios (PRR cabin cars in Steubenville).

For display only, Gary Strelick of the Mid-Mon Valley Model Railroad Club brought two photo albums with vintage photographs and images of railroad prototypes, including a mid-tolate 1950s photo of LIRR G5s #50 steaming past onlookers crowding the track on Long Island (with the tenements rising into the sky behind it), and a picture of Monessen Southwestern Railway #1, an ALCO 0-6-0 from 1913.

Minutes

George Pandelios

November 21, 2021 Business Meeting

Superintendent Frank Benders opened the November general division meeting at 2:34 PM.

He thanked the Mid-Mon Valley Club and the VFD of New Eagle.

Pass the Hat: Jeff Gregg passed the hat.

New members and/or guests: Tom Wilson introduced himself as a new member. Tom models in a number of scales. Welcome! We had two guests: Ken Kuehn, brother of Grier, and John Oleyar.

Patrick Altdorfer noted an error in last month's meeting minutes that somehow eluded the review process. The construction of the new wye module was incorrectly attributed; Rob Twigger should have received credit for its design and construction. He will correct this in next month's *Keystone Flyer*. With that exception, the minutes of the October meeting were accepted.

Committee Reports:

Flyer: Patrick Altdorfer requested that all submissions be in to him by midnight December 1. He reminded everyone that the online version is typically larger than 8 pages while the paper version is limited to 8 pages. Frank asked how many paper copies of the Keystone Flyer are mailed each month. Patrick indicated 8-10 and Susan Werner confirmed that the number was less than a dozen. Susan also took the opportunity to ask that if your e -mail has changed, please let her know. Patrick also noted that all previous editions are available on-line at the website.

Treasurer: Jeff Gregg reported that the division is solvent.

Programs: Andy Blenko reported that January's meeting will be hosted by the Ohio Valley Lines at their club in Ambridge, PA. There is no program as of yet. The February meeting will take place at the DARE Model Railroad club in Venetia, PA. Specifics to follow as they become available. The March meeting will take place and be hosted by the Morgantown, WV club in their new facility located at Mountaineer Mall & Professional Plaza, 5000 Green Bag Road, Morgantown, 26501.

Company Store: Susan Werner reported that she has a limited quantity of 2022 North Shore Railroad calendars for sale courtesy of Steven and Neal Schorr. The calendars feature 8 short line railroads found mostly in Central Pennsylvania. Susan has a number of sources at her disposal so if you want a particular book, there is a good chance she can order it for you.

Membership/Website: Tom Gaus was not present but Frank later forwarded his report. Tom reports that the Division has 188 active members. The Jamboree page is up and running. This season's Holiday Open Houses page is also up and running. If he missed any open houses, please let him know. The "Tid Bits" section has some recent additions that might be of interest. And finally, division member Dave Kitch was at the "Steam in the Cuyahoga Valley" event last month and put together some photos and videos. Dave's report is under a new section on our home page titled "Clinics, Presentations and Videos."

Free-Mo: Patrick Altdorfer reported that the Free-Mo group once again enjoyed a successful collaboration with the South Hills Model Railroad Club (SHMRRC) at the Greenberg Show on November 6 & 7 in Monroeville. Together, they fielded a large 16' x 22' loop with SHMRRC providing 3 modules and the Division bringing eight. The new wye (engineered and built by Rob Twigger) was used to join the two sections. Patrick will have extra photographs in the next edition of the Flyer. Free-Mo is still seeking new members and has modules available for "adoption." They have 3 meetings a year corresponding with the train shows in February, July, and November. Please contact Patrick for more information.

Bring-N-Brag: In the absence of Tracy Boyd and Richard Terek, Susan Werner administered the contest and reported the results.

Video Library: Bud Brock was not present, no report.

Achievement Program: Dennis Vaccaro reported submitting 3 certificate applications to Regional.

T-Trak: Richie Jodon reported that T-Trak enjoyed a successful Greenberg show. Twenty modules were fielded, arranged in the shape of the letter "F," generating a lot of interest from the show attendees. The next appearance for T-Trak will be the Greenberg show at the end of February. Richie also noted that Todd Blose and his family attended the show, traveling from South Carolina and bringing his Star Wars-themed modules. Todd also plans to attend the next show.

Jamboree: Grier Kuehn reported that the Jamboree is on schedule. He, Neal Schorr, and Jim Sacco have been making great progress towards the event. Grier brought both color and black and white Jamboree flyers for public distribution to interested parties, nine area hobby shops, businesses, and other public locations (e.g., libraries). Flyers will also be distributed at the February Greenberg Show. Grier reminded everyone that the raffle is crucial to the funding of the Jamboree and allows it to be offered at a relatively low price (far cheaper than other comparable 1-day events) and to break-even. Robert Morris University did not increase the rental fee for the building, but was forced to charge more for the meals; rising food costs at the store are something we are all seeing. In turn, that increase forced the Division to raise the price. As a result, Grier is urgently seeking donations for the raffle from an ever-dwindling number of hobby shops; your assistance in this area is requested. If you have anything to donate for the raffle, please bring it to one of the next 3 meetings. Remember, it must be new.

The raffle will also feature some very cool non-railroad items, including VISA gift cards and a Steelers helmet personally autographed by T.J. Watt! In addition to the standard popular vote contests – motive power, structures, and rolling stock, the Jamboree will bring back the very popular "What Can You Do with A Plasticville Kit?" contest from a few years ago.

Dennis Vaccaro announced that if you wish to have a model merit judged at Jamboree, please let him know and bring the required paperwork. And Susan Werner reminded everyone that only 88 points out of 125 are required to earn a merit certificate; essentially that's a grade of "C."

The Jamboree flyers will be distributed at a number of upcoming events including the Salem, OH show (1/9/2022), Mon Valley Railroad Historical Society in Morgantown, WV (December 18-19, 2021), Greenberg Show (February 27-28, 2022), Elizabeth Central VFD Train Show, Mid-Mon Valley Railroad Club Train Show, the McKeesport open house, Rochester Historical Society, Ohio Valley Lines, and the Pennsylvania Trolley Museum.

Grier noted that the Division website pages for the Jamboree have been updated and reposted. There are 12 clinics on the schedule; 4 are prototype related and 8 are focused on modeling. Neal Schorr reported that the layout tours will be geographically clustered south and southeast of Pittsburgh. The full list will follow.

Neal Schorr announced the banquet speaker will be industry insider Ryan Kunkle. Mr. Kunkle is an accomplished HO modeler, former Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania director, and current head of high-end product development for Lionel. Lionel is paying a portion of Mr. Kunkle's expenses for this speaking engagement. There will also be a luncheon speaker, specifics to be determined later.

Grier noted that the White Elephant sales form is now available on the Division website and can be used in 3 ways. It can be filled in and submitted on-line, printed and prepared in advance, or filled in at the event itself. Grier noted that Janet DeVault, who was very successful with the past sale, will be running this year's White Elephant sale. Keith DeVault recommended that members submit White Elephant information on-line in advance. This is greatly preferred and will make for a much more efficient operation.

Grier stated that there will also be a display area for those who simply wish to bring models to be viewed.






Ray Helster brought this framed print of a B&LE train crossing a trestle (left), which earned him a first place finish in the contest.

While our largest joint layout with SHMRRC was in July, this one proved to be the most interesting so far.

The Division Two Free-Mo group once again offered the public a great display at the Greenberg show. The South Hills Model

Railroad Club could bring only 3 of its modules this time, but Division Two picked up the slack by completing their oval with our modules, including the new WYE module designed, engineered, and built by Rob Twigger. (He also designed, engineered and built our first replacement WYE, as well as the new loop module.) Starting at the WYE, the Division Two Free-Mo layout became a point-to-point branchline railroad, where we could turn trains on our loop or at our other WYE.

These photos give you an idea of what can be accomplished by teamwork, as well as where we still have work to do to present a 100% scenicked railroad. But then again, think about any model railroad that you have visited, and when have they ever been



completely finished? There are always things that can be improved, tweaked, better realized, etc. Just as in real life, even the best laid plans go awry: pen & paper (or CAD) designed rights-of-way, once realized, prove to be problematic (e.g. curve radii may be too tight, hindering operation), or track or turnout switches get beat up, ballast falls off, or wiring comes loose during transit. At three

Running trains makes me thirsty, which I have incorporated into the theme of my module: the brewery (below) and icehouse/icing platform (not pictured).



shows per year (excluding our *annus horribilis* 2020-2021), that is a lot of jostling around of these modules.

Three of our critical modules were approaching their 15th birthdays last year: over the course of the past two years, Rob Twigger re-engineered and built two WYE modules and one Loop module to work (and transport) more effectively and efficiently. Dennis Lippert was instrumental in getting these modules wired up and running.

As frustrating as it can be when our model infrastructure requires attention, our commercial and residential structures — which give our modules character and purpose (i.e. "something to do" while playing with our trains) — all require maintenance, repairs, improvement, or occasional replacement.

And not only that, but our rolling stock and motive power

need to be maintained, and this means outfitting them with better running gear (often metal wheels, less fragile trucks, and durable couplers) and fancier bells and whistles. (Yes, literally: bells and whistles!) For our group, this means DCC operation: any motive power that began life as a DC model must be refitted with a DCC chip to enable cab control. While newer models are easy (just plug'n'play by installing the new chip into an NMRA socket), older models have to be upgraded manually, by soldering wires from the motor to the proper leads on the chip. Not for the faint of heart, and if you want to hear more about this, talk to Dave Maynard — he keeps his older Mantua steam locos (some even with open frame motors) going well beyond their natural lifespan.



We are always looking for interested people to join us, particularly if you can adopt one of our newer modules and commit to coming out to the show. Rick Montgomery did just this in 2019, just before Covid ran that interference play on our lives and hobby. But Rick took on two corner mod-

ules, the campground/station corner that Jerry Kyslinger had built, and another corner module that had not yet been scenicked. Rick added some of his own structures to Jerry's corner module, and he and his girlfriend Robbie Rayner created on the other corner module a busy commercial district, with sidings and several industries that require switching. (Robbie could not make the November show, unfortunately, so this module did not join us this time.)

We have great fun with it, and when we set up at the Greenberg Shows, our layout always attracts a





lot of interest from the public, perhaps because it can look different at almost every show. If you would like to join us, either to help out with setup and tear down, or better yet, to commit to the group by adopting one of our modules, please contact me (patrick.altdorfer@gmail.com or 412-559-3079) and let me know, and we can get you "all aboard." There are no extra fees, dues, etc., just an ask: be committed, come help us out, and come and run your trains (or ours) across our ever-changing layout.
