From the Super's Desk

You may have noticed that my last 3 columns have followed a theme: increasing member engagement. My reason for this is simple: Our organization is stronger when more members are more engaged.

<u>First Place</u> went to **Alden McBee** for his model of the D Tower in Grafton WV (top). The HO scale model was scratch built but not quite yet finished. The prototype tower was built in 1911 and torn down in December of 2017. He used blue prints from the B&O historical Society along with plans that were published in Model Railroader Magazine to construct his model.

<u>Second Place</u> went to **Mike Hohn** for his HO scale model of the Anderson, PA Depot (center). The structure was scratch built from a photograph of the actual

building.

<u>Third Place</u> went to **Grier Kuehn** for his HO scale model of a Pizza Shop (bottom). It started out as a City Classics company house kit. Scratch built additions were enclosed stairs and brick storefront. Added details were the asphalt shingles, block foundation, steps, gutters, downspouts, window dressing, vents, electric service, dumpster and signage. The interior included lights, floor, background walls, counter, and figures.

In Case You Missed It

Keystone Flyer

The current issue of *Railroad Model Craftsmen* (November 2023) published two features back-to-back that show alternative builds of the "Crafton Avenue Gas Station," one of the beautiful City Classics structure kits that Jim Sacco created and offered to the modeling community.

Chris Adams built the kit as the service station would have appeared in its heyday (the late 1940s on his layout), with all of the *streamline moderne* architectural elements intact: the large corner picture window, the use of porcelain tile as exterior cladding, and the clean horizontal lines and flat roof that lack the decorative elements of *fin de siècle* structures, all characteristics of the new trends in architecture and industrial design. And in a nice touch, Adams dedicated his Esso station to Jim Sacco by making him the proprietor!

Ken Hamilton achieved a very different effect using the same kit as the centerpiece of a diorama depicting a gas station site that has been long out of service, and which apparently was abandoned in the midst of an attempt to remove the subterranean fuel tanks. The unsightly mess of the now unearthed tanks pose an environmental hazard to the neighbors as well as to the juvenile delinquents who have vandalized the site with their graffiti and wanton destruction.

Both of these are fine examples of unleashed modeler imagination, as well as a reminder of Jim Sacco's enduring legacy in the model railroading hobby.


November 19: **New Eagle VFD** Social Hall

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
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Bring 'n' Brag (continued)

Here are more photos of models that were submitted for the Structures contest in October.

At right is another view of Alden McBee's D Tower at Grafton, next to the prototype photo of that corner of the building. This view highlights the aftercooler he scratch-built to represent the equipment used "for cooling the air for the electropneumatic switch machines." Alden also informed us at the meeting that he just found out that Leopard Architectural Models now offers a 3D printed versions of this tower.



Frank Benders brought an HO scale structure, a "Hay & Grain" store (right), a nice little mom & pop grocery with some interior details suggested in the windows, a barrel and bag of feed out front, and lightly weathered clapboard siding.





Keith DeVault submitted his HO scale rendition of the Western Maryland Railroad's Blaine Station (left), as it appeared in its third incarnation. Below is the back view of the station.

Rick Montgomery created Casa de Roma (left), an Italian restaurant, using an HO scale DPM Model, which he painted and detailed, installing LED lighting, roof and interior details, restaurant accessories from Noch, and a bunch of little people enjoying their pasta, zuppe, and pesce.

Neal Schorr kit-bashed the Espy Farm Supply in Spruce Creek (below left) from an old Ertl S scale structure that he modified significantly, including adding a concrete foundation to raise the height, replacing the molded man-door with an O scale door, and scratch-building a new garage door to achieve O scale proportions. He then added only limited detail and light weathering to reflect the relative youth and plain exterior of the prototype, a photo of which he also presented.



A modeler who chose to remain **Anonymous** submitted a fascinating 11-story tall building, the Ashmore Hotel (right). This structure appears to be complete, with window glazing and window treatments (I counted 160 individual hotel room windows just on the front of the building and two sides, plus two rows of wide picture windows on street and mezzanine levels all the way around). The rooftop included details such as asphalt, vents, the elevator machine room, and a ladder attached to the inset penthouse floor exterior walls, for access to the rooftop billboard advertising the "wise choice" of Owl Cigars. The rear of the building sported a roll-up garage door, a man door, and some faded posters and weathered block; and the storefront windows on ground level remind one of something you might have seen in an urban downtown area in the 1920s or 1930s, the decorative copper on its façade now corroded.



I am pleased to report that photos of my O-scale model of the Weirton Steel Open Hearth won the Photography category of the Dean Freytag award at the Steel Mill Modelers Special Interest Group (SMMSIG) annual meeting held in Pittsburgh July 27-29.


My model depicts the southern end (Furnaces 11, 12, 13, 14) of the prototype. It is scratch-built and consists of more than 2,200 individual pieces with a small number of 3-D printed componenets. It measures 37" wide, 72" long, and 34" tall.

Top Right: The left side of the building holds the Pouring Floor, while the Charging Floor is on the right. The open hearth furnaces straddle the midline of the building.



Below (left) Furnace No. 12 is being tapped while Furnace No. 11 (right) is being charged with molten iron from the blast furnaces.





In this photo, Furnace No. 14 is in the foreground. Immediately behind it, scratch-built buggies with their boxes of scrap await charging into Furnace No. 13. At the very back of the floor, a transfer crane positions a ladle to pour molten iron into Furnace No.

11. On the right, a worker fills a wheel barrow with chemicals that will be shoveled into a furnace through an open charging door.





The next two in-progress photos show the charging door details more clearly.

On the left, the water jacketed door, its water hoses, and lifting chain are visible.

The photo at right shows the chain lifting pulley, spool, and motor assembly.

Left: On the Pouring Floor, the 350 ton bridge crane positions the teeming ladle over the ingot molds and fills the rearmost ingot mold. The molds rest on scratch-built ingot buggies (flatcars).




Right: A view of the Pouring Floor from the rear is shown. The teeming crane appears in the distance.

Model statistics:

Weirton Steel Open Hearth in O Scale

- Dimensions: 72" long x 37" wide x 34" high
- Scratch-built no kits or kit-bashing
- Over 2,200 individual parts
- 5 smoke units (all smoke shown in photos is real)
- Each of the 4 furnaces (Nos. 11-14) represents a different phase of the open hearth process
- Ingot mold flatcars and scrap flatcars are scratch-built
- Ingot molds are cast from an original design

As a result of some new bench work completed in late October, the Open Hearth was moved into its position on the layout. The removable walls, roof, and cranes are yet to be re-installed in this photo.
