Joe Yakubisin used his Canon Powershot digital camera to capture this image of DRGW No. 463, Type K-27, in July 2019 at Chama, New Mexico. This "Mud Hen" 2-8-2 locomotive operates daily on the 3-foot gauge Cumbres & Toltec Railroad, connecting 64 miles of track between Chama and Antonito, Colorado. Joe notes that the DRGW ordered 15 Baldwin locomotives in the early 1920s, and this is the only operating model of two survivors - the other being No. 464, owned by Michigan's Huckleberry Railroad, and currently undergoing an overhaul.

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From the Super's Desk

By the time you read this, the holidays will be a memory. I hope it was a happy time for all of you and that you enjoyed the holiday sea-

The model railroad hobby and its association with Christmas got some great airtime in the Pittsburgh area. The local ABC affiliate WTAE ran two stories about local model railroad clubs and exhibits, calling to mind the long association of model trains to the holiday season. It was great to see these spots and they were rebroadcast several times.

My last column provided a description of the power member engagement brings to our organization. I'd like to share a firsthand account of the benefit of this to a model railroader;

Like many of you, my first model railroad experience occurred when I was about 5 and I got THE Christmas trainset. Then I got to see the Lionel layout that my grandfather was building. It was like I was inoculated with model railroading. But being young, I was alone with my hobby.

My father took me to see a layout built by a model railroad club (the West Island Model Railroad Club, Hicksville, NY). They didn't allow members until they were 21 years old, so I continued to model alone, but my head was full with what I saw.

Let me say that my modeling was pretty poor during this time. I modeled alone and didn't really have much spending money, so I banged away as a lone wolf until I turned 21.

At that point, I went down to the West Island Model Railroad Club's layout and asked to join. I learned that they had lowered the minimum age to 18! They let me join and I had a great couple of years as a member and learned a lot about model railroading. The nature of the club wasn't very engaging, but I got to work on a large layout.

A couple of years later I left the West Island Club and joined another club on Long Island (Nassau Model Railroad Club). I was a member of this club and got some new skills while there (still, not a really engaging organization) and then moved to Pittsburgh, where I knew nobody.

By my third week in Pittsburgh, I was a member of the Western Pennsylvania Model Railroad Museum. That exposed me to prototype model railroading on a grand scale for the first time.

That is three different organizations, each of which provided me with access to other modelers who helped me learn and improve my modeling skills. But I was still a lone wolf modeler in practice.

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



For those of you who haven't been to a meeting or event in a while, come join us and get involved. We'll all have a great time.





At right is a view of the Golden State's famed "Tehachapi Loop" of the Union Pacific Railroad, which the editor assumes was submitted by **David Grounds**, who used to live in the Bakersfield, California area.



At left is what appears to be a Santa Fe EMD diesel (F or E unit?) arriving in what may be Los Angeles. From the looks of the photo, the editor's best guess is this may have been taken by Mark Vinski, because it looks like the other vintage photographs he has submitted in the past.

Erie -- EL — Conrail: All ran through Mantua. The tracks have long since been removed."

Port Royal in O Scale

As many of you know, I am always taking random photos of my layout. Sometimes I share these photos on "O Gauge Railroading" - an internet forum for those interested in O scale and O gauge modeling and model railraoding. To see posts there, you must set up an account, and anyone can join; navigate to the site [ogrforum.ogaugerr.com] if you are interested in doing so. I share under the handle "PRR Middle Division."

One of the photos I recently shared on the forum is the one below, labeled Photo (1). I thought that it turned out particularly well, so I thought I would also share it with Division Two in the Keystone Flyer.



This photo is an image of the town of Port Royal and the PA Route 75 Bridge built by the Pennsylvania Railroad in 1910. The Port Royal station was built the same year, and it served passengers until the late 1940s. It was torn down by Penn Central in 1969. The model portrays the scene as it appeared in 1957.

I decided to compare it to a prototype image (Photo 2 overleaf) from the Port Royal Bicentennial website, which is reproduced with permission.

They were quite similar, so I decided to convert the color photo that I took to black and white and correct the color tones as much as possible to match the prototype image. Then I cropped both of them to resemble each other as much as possible (Photo 3). I think the corrected model photo pretty closely resembles the prototype photo, but you can judge for yourself.

2024 Incentive Rewards for Recruiting New Members

For the entire year of 2024, we would like to encourage current members to seek out potential new members at train shows, hobby shops, clubs, or anywhere such candidates might be found. Division Two will reward members for any new members they recruit.

This is how the reward program will work:

The current member tells the new member about the NMRA's RailPass program and that the division will pay for that RailPass if the following takes place:

The new member will complete an application on the NMRA website and purchase a RailPass membership (the new member must save his/her receipt).

The new member comes to a Division 2 meeting in one of the next 3 months that meetings are held.

The new member is issued a check for the RailPass membership (\$19.99) when their membership is confirmed on the Division's Membership list provided by the Mid-Central Region on the first of each month and they have fulfilled the requirement to attend a Division 2 meeting. Note that if the new member enrolls in any other membership level, we will refund the cost of a RailPass membership.

The recruiting member is issued a check for \$10.00 when the new member fulfills the requirement to attend a Division 2 meeting.

Since this Incentive Program will run for the full year, we are going to add 2 more incentives for our members.

At the end of 2024, any member who has recruited 3 or more new members who met the above requirements will receive a \$25 bonus.

At the end of 2024, any member who has recruited 5 or more new members who met the above requirements will receive a \$50 bonus.

Note, the bonuses cannot be stacked. Any member who is awarded the 5 recruits bonus will not (also) receive the 3 recruit bonus.

Making a Meeting Clinic

Here are some tips for anyone thinking about presenting a short clinic for one of our division meetings. Doing a clinic is simple and following these tips will make it even easier:

- · Pick a single, bounded topic that you are comfortable talking about
- Break your talk into 3 sections, as follows:
 - 1. Intro slide with topics (Tell the audience what you're going to tell them)
 - 2. One or two slides per topic (Cover the topics)
 - 3. Conclusion slide w/ topics you covered (Finish by telling them what you told them)
- Keep the length to 20-30 minutes; about 10-20 PowerPoint slides if you move along
- Q&A: Expect to get questions, and prepare answers to the Qs you most expect
- Bring along handouts or show-and-tell examples
- Use your slides as reference, but don't read them to the audience
- Practice giving your clinic and refine your timing

I am always on the lookout for meeting clinics and I am always available to help you create, review, or polish your clinic. My phone and e-mail are in the masthead, so please contact me if you have a topic you would like to present at a Division Two meeting
